

Most of all we really enjoyed learning about 'the deep blue sea' during our multi-sensory lessons in the hall.
















We thought you would like to see what a lovely day Class 1, 2 & 3 had at Wheelgate Park recently. The sun was shining and it was just wonderful!

My Center Parcs Residential Experience by Jane Foster (Parent Governor)

If I had been asked 2 years ago if Megan could attend a residential my immediate response as her Mam would have been a definite No.....

However, 1 year ago when the word 'residential' and Megan were mentioned in the same sentence I felt quite excited and said immediately – put her name down now....

Until Megan went on the Center Parcs residential she had only been looked after overnight by a family member.

So what made me change my mind? I think it was learning to accept that other people (Megan attends holiday/Saturday/afterschool club) can care for her and meet her needs in a way that is acceptable to me and if I couldn't trust the school staff who care for her every week who would I trust to care for her overnight.

It was a strange experience for Scott (big brother), Nik (Dad) and I being at home on the Monday without Megan. We didn't have to pick her up from afterschool club, then do the usual evening routines yet Nik and I still found ourselves clock watching ready to jump up to sort Megan out.

Nik and I went out for tea on the Tuesday and both managed to finish our meals at the same time without swapping chairs in order to support Megan to finish her meal.

Megan was due home on Wednesday so I went to join the group for lunch and to collect Megan for an appointment. Megan gave me one smile as if to say "hi why are you here?

Ginny was full of smiles – I personally believe she was thinking Thank Goodness for that no more listening to the raspberry blowing in the night....

Unfortunately 2 of the boys were poorly and weren't able to go on residential a thought was beginning to worm its way in my brain – shall I ask – no it will seem as if I don't want her home – but she is obviously having a fantastic time by the cool welcome I got – shy bairns get nowt (if you don't ask you don't get). So I did "If the boys aren't coming is there any chance Megs could stay?there my thought was out.

The bottom line was I rang school and Megan was able to stay the rest of the week until Friday.

Nik had to take Megs back to Center Parcs after her appointment so I never got to see Ginny's face when the Phantom Raspberry Blower arrived back to share her room.

I know from being at the villa and seeing the staff with the young people that I am ready to put Megan's name down for any residential she is offered.

She had a fantastic time and obviously didn't miss us too much. We don't have a hot tub at home, dine out every night or take her out socialising every day.

Her Auntie and Grandma got a much more animated hello than I did when we went to collect her on Friday.

As a parent I would say – Let your child go on a residential – they will have a whale of a time....THANK YOU to school for giving me the opportunity to say that both of my 'kids' have attended a school residential as I never ever thought I would be able to say that.

As a governor I would like to say a HUGE THANK YOU to school for always thinking out side of the box where our children are concerned. That to me is one of the reasons why our school is OUTSTANDING.....
